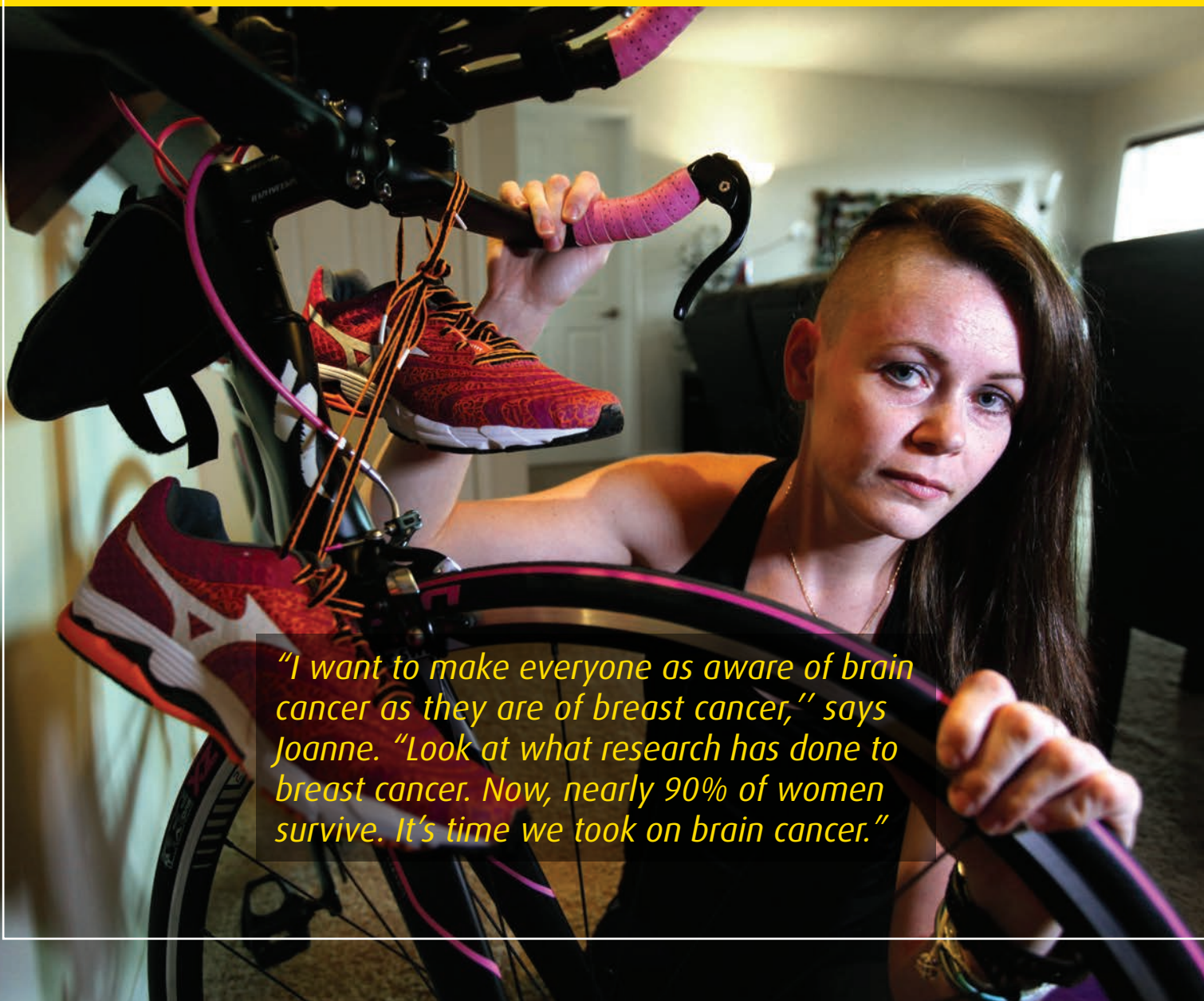

Joanne Schiewe (cover photo and below) ran in this year's Winnipeg Police Service Half Marathon before competing in a half Ironman in Calgary. Those are impressive achievements. But consider the fact that Joanne, 35, is also undergoing treatment for glioblastoma multiforme, an aggressive form of brain cancer.

Last February, Joanne's doctor said she had 12 to 18 months to live. More than a year later, Joanne is not slowing down. A big part of what's driving her? The determination to raise money and awareness in the fight against a disease that kills about 2,000 Canadians a year and has a 5-year survival rate of 25% – less than half the overall cancer survival rate.

Amid surgeries, radiation and chemotherapy treatments, Joanne has tirelessly raised money for research, including \$25,000 that is being matched by Brain Canada through the Canada Brain Research Fund (a public-private partnership established by the Government of Canada), another example of the Canadian Cancer Society's commitment to build important partnerships for the benefit of cancer research. This collaboration will also enable the Winnipeg Police Service Half Marathon committee to raise \$1.25 million (including the Brain Canada match) for brain cancer research over the next 5 years.

"Any fundraising for brain cancer means that I may get to eventually benefit from it and hopefully extend my chance at living a long and healthy life," Joanne says. "Even if I specifically don't get the chance to benefit from this, others will. That matters to me."



"I want to make everyone as aware of brain cancer as they are of breast cancer," says Joanne. "Look at what research has done to breast cancer. Now, nearly 90% of women survive. It's time we took on brain cancer."

Executive summary

In 2015/16, your support made it possible for us to deliver on our promise to have more impact, against more cancers, in more communities, than any other cancer charity in Canada. Quite simply, no one else is doing what we do for the benefit of Canadians – and no other cancer charity accomplishes more.

The success of the Canadian Cancer Society is only made possible through your support and generosity. Together we are saving lives. We're doing it through investments in research that open the doors to treatments and therapies that were unimaginable only a few short years ago. Working in partnership with you, as the largest national charitable funder of cancer research in Canada we invested \$44 million in research on a broad range of cancers including those that are rare or difficult to treat. Discoveries from Society-funded research benefit all Canadians regardless of where they live.

Your donations supported advocacy efforts that helped governments limit flavoured tobacco and electronic cigarettes, particularly to minors. Bans on the use of indoor tanning facilities by minors are in place almost everywhere in Canada. The newly elected federal government's commitment to address national healthcare challenges – including caregiver support, home care services, healthy eating, and plain packaging of tobacco –

continue to be advanced through the Society's support. Together we are making change happen for the benefit of all Canadians.

As Canada's cancer charity for nearly 80 years, we're taking every step to stop cancer in its tracks. However, we can't do it without you, and the need for continued support has never been greater. Survival rates are higher than they have ever been before yet the number of new cancer cases in Canada will rise about 40% in the next 15 years due in a large part to Canada's aging population.

Many thousands of Canadians participated in our signature fundraising events, Relay For Life and Daffodil Month. Many more volunteered in support of our mission-related programs and activities. Your contributions resonate with Canadians everywhere and play a vital role in all that we do.

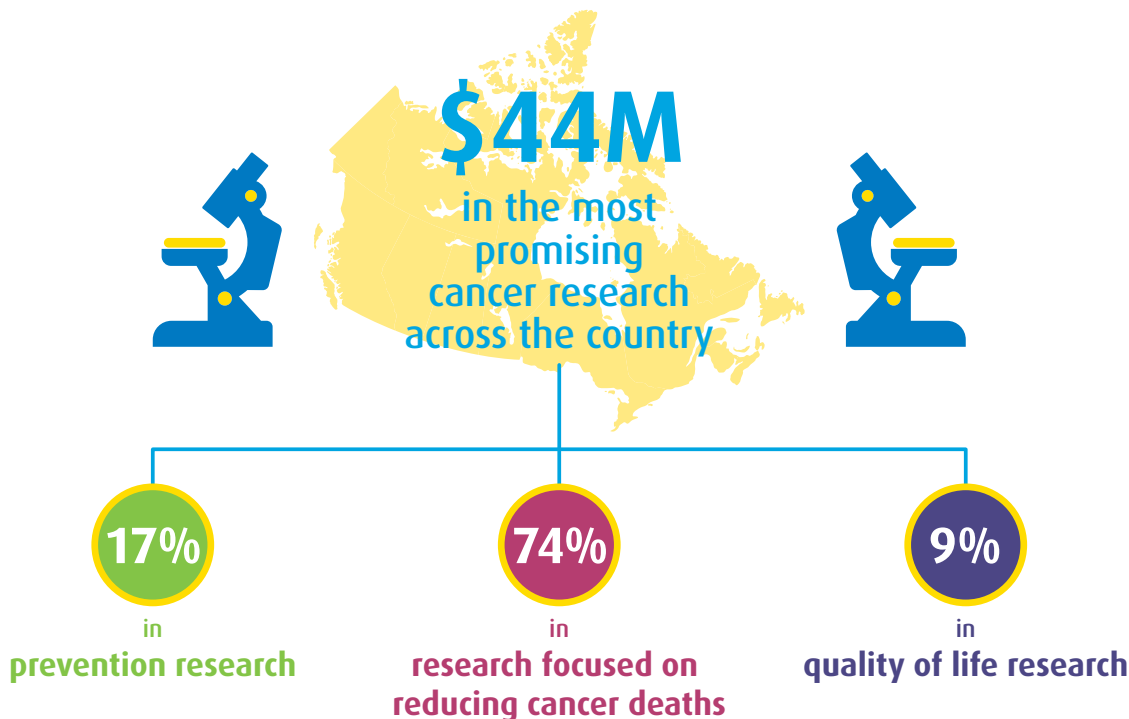
You're putting more brainpower to brain cancer

In children, medulloblastoma and neuroblastoma can be aggressive and hard to treat. **Dr Poul Sorensen** at the University of British Columbia believes he has found the Achilles heel of tumour cells: an enzyme that enables cells to adapt and survive under stress. With the Ride2Survive Brain Cancer Impact Grant of the Canadian Cancer Society and Brain Canada, Dr Sorensen is testing whether blocking this enzyme makes cells more sensitive to treatment. Thanks to you, and the generosity of our top donors Brain Tumour Foundation of Canada, Winnipeg Police Services Half Marathon and Ride2Survive, our partnership with Brain Canada funded 4 \$1.25 million Impact Grants in brain cancer research in 2015.



Research

Through the generosity of donors like you, in 2015 we were able to support:



Just a few examples of what your donations have accomplished:

Prevention



Dr David Hammond at the **University of Waterloo** revealed that the use of e-cigarettes in Canada is highest among tobacco smokers and young people, underlining the need to fully understand their health effects as they rise in popularity.

Reducing cancer deaths



Dr Robert Day at the **Université de Sherbrooke** provided the first evidence that blocking a protein called PACE4 stops prostate cancer growth in mice. Drugs that block PACE4 are being tested as new cancer therapies.

Quality of life



Dr Lisa Barbera at the **Sunnybrook Research Institute** and the Society-supported **Canadian Centre for Applied Research in Cancer Control** found considerable variation in end-of-life care across 4 provinces and established quality benchmarks to improve healthcare services for patients.

**You've made Nova Scotia
a world leader in tobacco
control**



Nova Scotia made history in May 2015 by becoming the first jurisdiction in the world to ban flavoured tobacco, including menthol. Smoking accounts for approximately 30% of all cancer deaths in Canada, and the Society has been campaigning for a ban on flavoured products, which often appeal to young people. This historic achievement signals a firm commitment to the prevention of tobacco-related disease.



Priorities for the new federal government

In July 2015, the Canadian Cancer Society released a federal election platform document pointing to 3 specific areas where the incoming federal government should take immediate action to repair existing policy gaps and lay the foundation for further progress: prevention (including tobacco), research and palliative care.

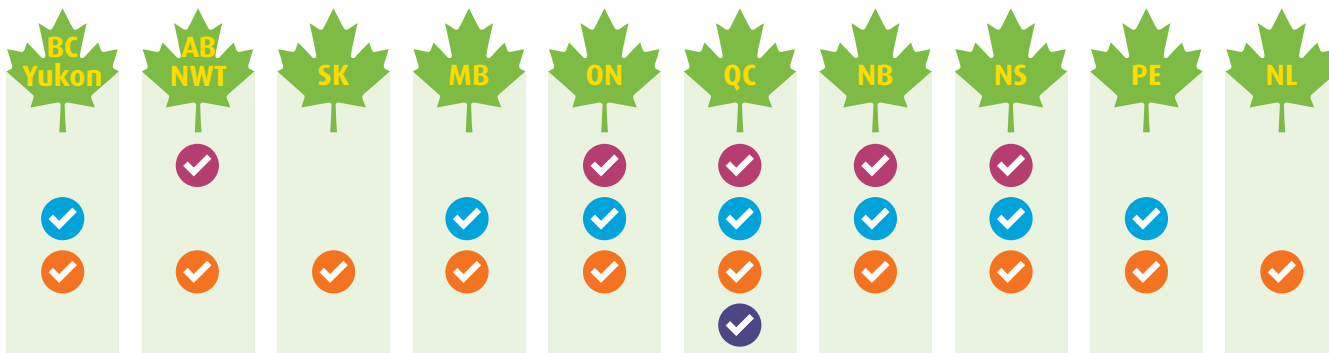
The newly elected government in Ottawa has said it will take action on some of the Society's most important priorities. Among the new government's most important commitments are its promises to:

- reduce tobacco use by introducing plain packaging rules
- improve financial support for family caregivers
- invest \$3 billion over 4 years to improve access to home care services
- promote healthier eating



The Canadian Cancer Society is making progress in many areas through its advocacy with government

- ✓ **Flavoured tobacco:** 5 provinces (AB, ON, QC, NB, NS) have adopted legislation to ban flavoured tobacco, including menthol.
- ✓ **E-cigarettes:** 7 provinces (BC, MB, ON, QC, NB, NS, PE) have brought forward legislation to regulate electronic cigarettes, including bans on sales to minors and prohibiting e-cigarette use in places where smoking is banned.
- ✓ **Indoor tanning:** Bans on the use of indoor tanning facilities by minors are now in place or being developed in every province and territory in Canada.
- ✓ **Palliative care:** The Government of Quebec has announced a 5-year plan to improve palliative care. The Society's palliative care report, Right to Care: Palliative Care for all Canadians, released in January 2016, calls for action to improve care across the country.



You're bringing cancer education to Inuit communities

Cancer hits Inuit hard. Compared to the general population, Inuit have almost double the incidence of cancer, and knowledge about cancer and awareness about screening and prevention in these communities are low.

But thanks to the generosity of Jaguar Land Rover Canada an ambitious initiative has been launched to build knowledge and improve outcomes. In partnership with the Society, Jaguar Land Rover Canada funding has fostered The Inuit Cancer Project, benefiting Pauktuutit Inuit Women of Canada – a national not-for-profit organization representing all Inuit women in Canada.

Thanks to a leadership gift from Jaguar Land Rover Canada, culturally appropriate resources are being developed to facilitate and improve Inuit access to cancer information and knowledge about cancer. Better access to information will greatly reduce the kind of fears that can prevent people from getting help and will improve access to care.

Information and support

We answered nearly **50,000 inquiries** by phone and email.



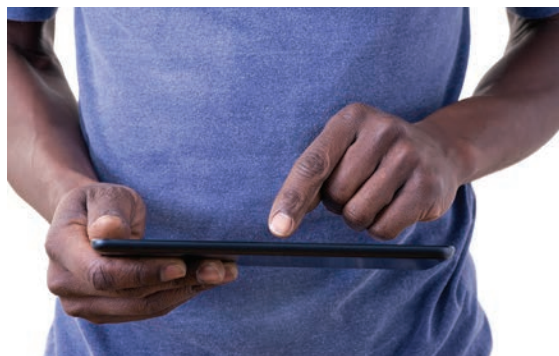
We distributed more than **1.1 million copies** of print materials.



Our peer support program gave **4,253 people living with cancer** a place to discuss their experiences with volunteers who have been there.

We're proud to be a trusted source, responding to Canadians' evolving online and mobile information needs:

- There were over **11 million** visitors to cancer.ca – an increase of about 29% over the previous year.
- Cancer information resources were viewed by **92%** of cancer.ca visitors.
- Visitors to our online community, CancerConnection.ca, increased by **30%** over 2014.
- Visitors through mobile devices grew to **5.4 million** – an increase of 56% over 2014.

Promoting health across Newfoundland and Labrador



Residents of Newfoundland and Labrador have the country's highest cancer incidence rates and the highest smoking, drinking and obesity rates. The Husky Energy Cancer Prevention Program aims to change that. Launched in early 2015, thanks to a \$1.05 million gift from Husky Energy, the program is taking the cancer prevention message to people in the province's remote outposts and urban centres like never before.

About half of cancers can be prevented by making healthy lifestyle choices. The Husky Energy Cancer Prevention Program is making a difference by communicating this vital message in schools and workplaces, to sports groups and at community events.

Policy and prevention

Canadian Cancer Society content experts constantly review research and engage with health stakeholders to improve our understanding of what causes cancer, how to prevent cancer and how to find cancer early, so that we can inform and advocate in the interests of improving life for all Canadians.

The focus of our attention last year included:

red meat



e-cigarettes



asbestos



marijuana



HPV vaccines



breast cancer screening



We worked with researchers and other health groups on cancer prevention initiatives that led to:

- updated sun safety guidelines
- new information on the burden of occupational cancers
- agreement on cancer and chronic disease prevention priorities for Canada



2015 marked the one-year anniversary of our online, interactive tool **It's My Life!** – designed to educate, engage and empower Canadians in their understanding of cancer statistics and how their lifestyle can affect their risk of developing cancer.

A Dream Team to help make our mission a reality

Relay For Life is one of Canada's most important cancer fundraisers. In 2015, the Society put a new twist on the event with a national Relay For Life Dream Team, made up of 50 business and community leaders who each pledged to raise \$10,000.

Cancer survivor **Bert Munro** was one of the inaugural nationwide Dream Team members. With the support of his employer, Associated Engineering, Bert created a dynamic one-man Saskatoon Relay For Life team. Since 2005, Bert has raised a total of \$220,000 for the Society.

Relay/Daffodil

Your generous donations, countless volunteer hours and passionate contributions to our fundraising events allow us to continue the fight against all cancers, for all Canadians.

Relay For Life

Since 1999, Relay For Life in Canada has been a fundamental part of the Canadian Cancer Society as an experience that embodies the values of the organization and a fundraiser that fuels our mission.

2015 highlights

- **421** Relay For Life events were held.
- Over **\$33 million** was raised to advance cancer research and support Canadians living with cancer.
- **197 (47%)** of these Relay events have been running for **10 years or more**, while **35** were new additions in 2015.



Daffodil campaign

Over **\$16.5 million** was raised in support of the fight against cancer, thanks to the work of **53,000** volunteers who canvassed, sold flowers and pins, and organized special events.

New initiatives

British Columbia and Yukon introduced the Daffodil Dash, a fun, family-oriented walk and run.

- Held the last Sunday in April, Daffodil Dash provided a fitting close to the month and was an opportunity to celebrate and thank donors and supporters.
- Daffodil Dash raised over **\$90,000** across 4 locations.



Paint your workplace/school yellow

- A new program to introduce daffodil-themed fundraising activities in workplaces and schools.
- **500 workplaces** and **237 schools** participated in the Ontario pilot, raising over **\$158,000**.

Awards for Excellence in Cancer Research

Last June, the Canadian Cancer Society honoured the 2015 recipients of the award for their tremendous contributions. 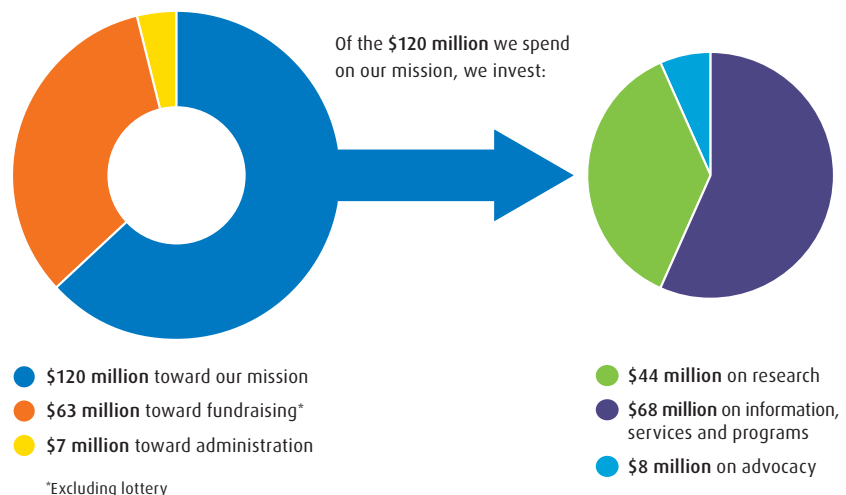
