Manitoba currently has one of the lowest residential hospice bed ratios in the country with only 0.8 beds/100,000 residents. If elected, would you increase the number of residential hospice beds in Manitoba within the next four years?	YES	We know there needs to be an increase in the number of beds in the hospital system after the cuts that have recently been instituted by the Pallister PCs. That's why we would support adding new beds to our hospital system, as well as adding new residential hospice beds to the health care system over the course of our mandate. We know there needs to be a strategy to integrate this addition into the broader health care system and we are committed to doing so through the development of a province-wide palliative care strategy.			Our PC team is committed to quality patient care for all Manitobans no matter where they live, and we have focused on reducing waits for health care services which were unacceptably high when we came to office. To ensure our health care system can accomplish this goal, our PC government tasked Shared Health with developing Manitoba's first Provincial Clinical and Preventive Services Plan. This plan will be developed by 11 teams specializing in different fields of medicine. One of these 11 teams will be studying cancer and palliative care. Part of their study will focus on ensuring appropriate resources are in place at this extremely important time of life, and we will be guided by their advice with regard to the appropriate deployment of residential hospice beds.
The biggest gaps in palliative services in Manitoba are in rural and remote communities. If elected, would you set benchmarks to increase the number of health care providers and services focused on palliative care in community and rural settings?	YES	We have committed in our platform to strengthening training for all health care professionals on issues related to palliative care. We know training is very important for health care workers in urgent, acute and community settings. And we know we can increase in training can lead to an increase in the availability of palliative services. We have also committed to hiring more nurses and adding more supports for home care services. We will invest in public home care and new beds, not cuts and privatization. We will work to immediately replace reductions in nurses and home care workers that have hit rural and remote communities in our province in order to address the shortage over the course of our mandate.			Our PC team understands the pressures being placed on health care systems throughout the country as our population continues ages. The bilateral agreement our government signed with the federal government which will provide \$400 million over ten years to improve home care and palliative care services available to Manitobans. This agreement was applauded by Palliative Manitoba as well as the Canadian Cancer Society. In particular, we plan to focus on palliative care outside of Winnipeg as we know there are great needs in rural Manitoba. If re-elected, a PC government has committed to investing \$2 billion into our health care system over the next mandate. We will continue to invest in services that help all Manitobans receive quality patient care.
If elected, would you amend legislation to allow patients simultaneous access to both the Palliative Care Drug Access Program and the Home Cancer Drug Program to allow a seamless transition at end of life?	YES	We know how important it is for end of life patients to live in as much comfort as possible in the dignity of their own home. We will work with experts to ensure there is a seamless transition at end of life for patients – and we will take whatever regulatory, policy or legislative means necessary to make that a reality.
